Policy Owner:	Saulteau First Nations - Department of Member Services

Authorization:	Chief and Council

## 1.1. PURPOSE AND INTENT

The Social Transportation policy has been developed to create procedures around enhancing community access to reliable social transportation systems, improving health outcomes and basic human needs, and maintaining effective communication for all Saulteau First Nations members by addressing service quality concerns.

### 1.2. SCOPE

This policy provides safe reliable transportation to Saulteau First Nations membership as per an establish schedule.

### 1.3. PROCEDURES

This service is for local transportation and cannot go outside the area that requires overnight layovers.

Schedule will be posted in departments & buildings, Facebook, newsletters, and on any other suitable media.



## 1.4. REQUIREMENT

### ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

It is the intent of Saulteau First Nations to provide procedures that will aid the transportation challenges for Saulteau First Nations members and community members per the following criteria.

- a) This transportation shall be accessible solely for registered Saulteau First Nations Band & Community Members.
- b) Band members living on or off the reserve shall have the right to access this transportation at no cost.
- c) Non-First Nations and SFN employees are not permitted to be transported in the social transit vehicle except during community events.
- d) Minors are not permitted to access the transit vehicle alone unless accompanied by a parent or guardian except in the case of youth community events. (For the sake of this policy, minors are referred to individuals who are 17 years and under)

### GENERAL REGULATIONS

### Community Members

- a) This policy shall be adhered to strictly by all Saulteau First Nations Members & Community Members except otherwise stated by the Chief and Council.
- b) Members shall communicate expectations for community members' behavior and conduct while utilizing social transportation services; this shall include respect for drivers, fellow passengers, and the vehicle itself.
- c) Every member of the Saulteau First Nations community is required to follow the booking and scheduling procedures established by the membership department.
- d) Community members shall in no way abuse the schedules outlined by the Saulteau First Nations membership department.
- e) It is imperative for community members to maintain punctuality for pickups and drop-offs, including grace periods, to provide efficient service for all passengers.
- f) Community members must follow all applicable health and safety standards and general norms while travelling, including wearing seatbelts, not smoking in the vehicle, and any other safety and legal requirements.



Social Transportation Driver

- a) Schedule will be fixed to ensure consistent and convenient transportation for Saulteau First Nations Members & Community Members.
- b) Adhere to designated pick up and drop off points-wait times at pick up and drop off points will be 15 minutes.
- c) Times for pick up and drop of points will be adhered to, the driver is not responsible if you miss the pickup times & points.
- d) Inclement weather and road conditions may cause cancellation of service for a temporary period to ensure safety of driver and passengers. This will be communicated as efficiently as possible to Saulteau First Nations Members & Community Members.
- e) Passengers are on a first come first serve basis for scheduled runs.

## THIRTEEN WOMEN ARE FIRST-EVER TO ACHIEVE INDIGENOUS FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT CERTIFICATE THROUGH AFOA CANADA, AFOA BC AND LANGARA COLLEGE

**OTTAWA, Sept. 19, 2023** – AFOA Canada, AFOA British Columbia (AFOA BC) and Langara College are pleased to announce the first graduates from the Indigenous Financial Management Certificate. Thirteen women working in First Nations Governments across British Columbia achieved the certificate as part of the first-ever cohort of this program.

Students are recruited from Indigenous communities throughout B.C. to enroll in the program and complete all the course requirements to attain the certificate. They study fully accredited post-secondary accounting in combination with AFOA Canada's Indigenous content. The ultimate goal is to build financial capacity within Indigenous Governments and communities, to support their goal of self-determination. The program was announced in September 2021.

"These 13 incredible women were dedicated



to their own professional development, while working in First Nations Governments and maintaining their family and community responsibilities," says Terry Goodtrack, President and CEO, AFOA Canada. "They created a supportive network amongst each other to uplift and encourage each other. We are incredibly humbled to be a part of this achievement."

"I am so incredibly proud of these women who persevered through the 18 months to get this done. They are truly a testament to the power of having a network of support around you to help you succeed" says Wendy Ham, Executive Director, AFOA BC "it was wonderful to be a part of their journey."

Dr. Paula Burns, President and CEO of Langara College noted "Langara College is very proud and honored to have played a role in this important endeavor. My most heartfelt congratulations to the students who have worked so hard to accomplish this. They have blazed a critically important path that can now be followed by many. My most sincere appreciation, also, to the supportive families and the many people who have worked so hard to make this a reality."

The Indigenous Financial Management Certificate is the first step towards the Certified Aboriginal Financial Manager (CAFM) designation. Students enrolled in this program may also further their

education by transferring several of these credits to Langara College or the Chartered Professional Accountant (CPA) program. AFOA Canada owns, administers, and awards the Certified Aboriginal Financial Manager (CAFM) designation.

Cohort 2 began in Fall of 2022 and <u>applications are currently being accepted for cohort 3.</u> The deadline is September 30, 2023.



# **COLLABORATIVE GAME CHECKS**



## **OVERVIEW**

- The survey collection took place between September and October.
- Technical staff, observers and biologists attended 11 road checks.
  Nino surveyors in total
- Nine surveyors in total.
- In total 94 hunting groups were surveyed.
- The majority were in groups of 2-3.
- Representing 207 individual hunters.



# HUNTER'S INFO CONTINUED

### Weapons Used


- 80 respondents used rifle as the primary weapon for hunting.
- Compound Bow was the second weapon of choice(9 individuals).

# Distance traveled from main road

- Over 50% traveled over 10km from the main road.
- 15 individuals preferred to not respond.



The primary species hunted was elk followed closely by moose.



### Wildlife Management units Hunted

Relatively equal distribution of hunting location was observed. However, equal distribution of survey collection is required to generate a meaningful response.



# **FUTURE STEPS**

Collecting input from surveyors.

Set up predetermined scheduel for 2023.

Redevelop the survey with the help of T8WWG and surveyors (surveyors draft ready).


