

All other repair requests will be dealt with subject to budget availability.

An EMERGENCY repair is considered any accident, break or defect in interior plumbing, heating or electrical system, or safety feature in any part of the home.

Help Your Child Succeed in School: **Build the Habit of Good Attendance Early**

DID YOU KNOW?

- Starting in preschool and kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10%, or about 2 days each month over the course of a school year, can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just 1 or 2 days every few weeks.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- Absences and tardiness can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is important. Eventually good attendance will be a skill that will help them succeed in high school and college.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- · Set a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Keep your child healthy and make sure your child has the required shots.
- Introduce your children to their teachers and classmates before school starts.
- Develop backup plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor or another parent.
- Try to schedule non-Covid-19 related medical appointments and extended trips when school isn't in session.
- If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, school counselors and other parents for advice on how to make your child feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- If you are concerned that your child may have Covid-19, call your school for advice.
- If your child must stay home due to illness or quarantine, ask the teacher for resources and ideas to continue learning at home.

HPV Selfscreening Pilot Project

IS COMING TO ITS END AT THE END OF OCTOBER 2022

This test checks to see if you have one of the Human Papilloma viruses that can cause cervical cancer. It replaces a PAP test that would normally be done by the doctor. This screening finds the viruses that can cause cancer before they make changes to your cells. A PAP test finds the cells after they start changing into cancer.

You are eligible for HPV selfscreening if:

- · You have a cervix
- You have not had a PAP in the past 3 years
- · You are not pregnant
- You have not had cervical cancer in the past 5 years
- You are between the ages of 25-65



This project allows you to do your own swab with something the size of a q-tip. There is no pain involved. You do not get undressed in front of anyone. You do this test in the health center bathroom in private.

This screening is also done every 3 years (if available). This is for on and off reserve, indigenous and non-indigenous or staff. You must be a patient of Dr. Banas or receiving health services from the Saulteau First Nations Health Center. You will be called with your results approximately one month after testing.

Wood Supply Subsidy for Community

Amended by Council October 26, 2020

Intent

Saulteau First Nations strives to serve its citizens and members in a respectful way and to assist those members who are in the most need of assistance with delivery and supply of wood to supplement the high costs of heating and fuel. With that in mind, Saulteau First Nations will provide this assistance in the form of wood delivery to those individuals who qualify as per the terms of this policy. This will ensure that the members who qualify are aware of the service and can benefit from this program. This is for wood delivery to a household for the purpose of heating a home only and will not be provided as cash or other compensation. It is not provided for heating outbuildings and open fires. This is considered a subsidy to the member who meets the criteria as listed below.

The intent of this Policy is to ensure that Saulteau First Nations' citizens and members understand who qualifies for this program to ensure that we can provide this service on an ongoing basis without depleting our resources in the future.

Members applying for this assistance will be required to fill out the attached form to declare their need.

Scope

The Wood Supply Policy applies to all Saulteau First Nations citizens, community members and employees who qualify as per the following criteria as defined below:

NOTE: All members wishing to take advantage of this policy must apply.

- 1. Elder over 65 years of age wood will be delivered
- 2. Persons with disabilities wood will be delivered
- 3. Single women who live alone or with young children wood will be delivered
- 4. Elders over age 55 who are unemployed wood will be delivered

- 5. 55+ are eligible for wood but they must pick up their own wood at the site on the days that the SFN has the gates open and manned.
- 6. SFN will post the days that the site will be open for members to pick up their wood so that the site is supervised.

The wood delivery will be done a minimum of **once** per year and to a **maximum of three** times to each household that qualifies. Each qualifying household will be provided with an equal amount of wood based on the current wood inventory at the time. **This should not be relied upon as the sole source of heat for any household, as the available supply varies. The client will be required to sign a receipt of delivery that they have received the wood as it is delivered.**

NOTE: The wood supply to the Nation is sporadic and may vary from year to year based on availability and supply chain. It is the applicant's responsibility to ensure that wood is stored appropriately and is used for the intended purpose. Misuse of this subsidy may result in a lack of supply during the most crucial months.

Elders over 65 years who do not have wood heat will get a propane allowance of \$250 per year to assist with costs.

Definitions

- 1. Elder over 65 years of age who are unemployed. This refers to Elders who are on pension and do not have any other income.
- Persons with disabilities is a person who has been diagnosed with a disability who does not have the ability to harvest or pay for their own wood, is living alone and does not have a family member to assist with harvesting wood. This applies to person with disability who are on social assistance and to those persons with disabilities who are employed. It is based on ability to harvest their own supply of wood.
- 3. Single women who live alone or with young children this refers to single women living with small children who do not have the resources to harvest or pay for their own wood supply.
- **4.** Elders over age 55 who are unemployed and do not have the resources to harvest or pay for their own wood supply.

Policy Guidelines

Saulteau First Nations retains the right to determine the best use of its donated wood supply as it deems appropriate in determining how said resources are administered to the benefit of

Saulteau First Nations' citizens, members or employees for wood subsidy purposes. The disbursement of said wood shall be performed in a consistent manner where the greatest benefit is realized by the greatest number of citizens and members according to the application list. Applicants will need to note on the application what their wood supply needs would be for the year so that the wood may be evenly distributed to those who have no other heat source.

Any Saulteau First Nations' citizen, community member or employee who wishes to access this subsidy **must apply** In August of each year to be put on the delivery list before fall. The deadline for application is Sept 1, of each year. Any and all applicants may be required to provide proof of their eligibility by providing such documents as members of household, income verification, other such proof of eligibility.

If an application is denied the member will have the ability to appeal the decision Director of Operations but the applicant may be required to disclose all information to the Director of Operations to ensure a proper appeal process can be conducted.

The individual is to contact the appropriate personnel at the Saulteau First Nations' Housing and Social Development Office 250-788-3955 to request an application and ensure they are on the list for deliveries.

It is the responsibility of the individual, and <u>not</u> the Saulteau First Nations, to ensure that all eligibility requirements are met, applications and required documentation are completed and submitted by the respective submission dates for the wood subsidy program. The staff of the housing or social assistance departments will assist the individual in their application process, but are <u>not</u> responsible for ensuring that the applications and submissions are completed accurately or on time. The departments will be responsible for ensuring the list is maintained and accurate upon deadline date. It is the individual's responsibility to ensure that they complete the following application.
