We are listening and would like to reply to the comments and questions.

- We are expanding a grade every other year in hopes of eventually having a full school for our community. We have expanded already from a half-day pre-K and full-day Kindergarten program to full day pre-K to grade 2 and will be applying for grade 3 in the fall. Space is always an issue, hopefully not for long.
- Now that we have made it through the pandemic, we welcome our Elders and community members to our school to share their knowledge with us. We value all SFN community and want to continue to build relationships. There will be a call-out going out shortly to develop a list for the fall.
- We are currently building an outdoor classroom, have been working on this for a couple of years to incorporate more land-based learning and cultural teachings in our curriculum.
- We do have a public Facebook page for advertising and advertise in our SFN
 monthly newsletter often to ensure our program is known. We have held
 community sessions pre-COVID and plan to do so again to engage more face-to-face
 with the community.
- We attend fieldtrips in the local forests and to our Twin Sisters nursery to learn about local plants and medicines.
- Four days a week we have a 45-minute Cree language and culture block that all students attend. It is very well received by our families. It includes both traditional and contemporary knowledge of Indigenous people.

LET'S TALK ABOUT LAND MANAGEMENT

Saulteau Land Code

Many First Nation communities are choosing to strengthen their self-governance and jurisdiction over their reserve lands by developing and ratifying a Land Code. Having a Land Code in place allows First Nation communities to repeal 44 sections of the Indian Act that dictate how First Nations must manage and govern their reserve lands. First Nations across Canada are developing Land Codes to reclaim authority over their reserve lands from the Government of Canada and implement their own land laws and processes.

Saulteau is committed to strengthening our self-governance and sovereignty as a Nation. Developing and ratifying a **Land Code** will allow our Nation to assert full control over our reserve lands, including future TLE and Hydro Settlement lands as they are added to reserve. Over the next 1 to 2 years, we will be working with the community to develop and ratify our own **Land Code**. This is an exciting moment for our Nation, and we look forward to engaging all our members on this important development!

Stay tuned for future project announcements, including calls to establish our Land Code Steering Committee!

Over 100 First Nations across Canada have established a Land Code and another 61 First Nations are in the process of developing one!

What is a Land Code

- A comprehensive land law specific to a First Nation community
- Sets out the principles, procedures, and rules of land management and decision-making authority
- Removes Indigenous Services
 Canada as our "landlord" and gives
 us back authority over our lands

Why have a land code

- Replaces land management provisions forced on Saulteau through the Indian Act
- Allow Saulteau to create our own laws regarding the development, conservation, protection, use and possession of reserve land(s)
- Set rules and procedures for use and occupation of Saulteau lands as developed by our members



How does a Land Code come into effect

- Saulteau's Land Code will need your support. It must be ratified by a community vote!
- Saulteau must follow set procedures for community ratification process



What does a Land Code not do

- It doesn't turn our First Nation into a "municipality"
- It doesn't take away our Treaty Rights or the Canada's financial obligations to our Nation
- It does not give up our reserve lands or take away their "reserve" status
- It does not deal with taxation of property or individuals

BAT FRIENDLY COMMUNITY

Bats face many threats, from white-nose syndrome to habitat loss. Developing a bat-friendly community is a way to take local action on many aspects of bat conservation. A bat-friendly community works to incorporate bat habitats into planning processes, reduces direct threats to bats, and promotes education and awareness of bats.

The end result: a community where bat habitat is valued and protected, where citizens are aware of bats and the threats they face locally and nationally, and where citizens are engaged in educational and stewardship activities to protect bats and bat habitat.

We have taken a few of the steps to reach this goal but now need some input and help from the community!



July 11th - August 5th BC
Annual Bat Count
Do you have bats living in your home? Or thinking they are roosting somewhere on your property?
Please reach out to us! And we will send our guardians to come to and count bats, this information will then be added to the provincial bat count data.

NABat (North American Bat Monitoring Program Our guardians and NABat specialists set up four bat detectors to record high frequency bat calls, these recordings are then analyzed and the number and species in the area are documented. Also two nightly transects where driven to record additional bat calls. Our guardians for the next 5-7 years will be responsible for setting up the detectors and driving the transects to add to the muchneeded information for understanding bat populations in the region.



REMINDER: FireSmart Assessments

Saulteau First Nations continues to have our Local FireSmart Representatives (LFR) conduct FireSmart Home Assessments at every home on reserve.

This project will continue throughout the summer and into the fall.

The LFR's will perform outdoor assessments of each home and of the home ignition zone that surrounds it. For ease of identification, Local FireSmart Representatives will be wearing a reflective vest with "LFR" on the back.

The LFR Reps will not be entering your home; merely looking outside to identify the following things:

- Vulnerability of homes to embers, and ignition of small surface fires.
- Factors that impact hazards and influence fire behavior or structure ignitability.
- Condition of the structures themselves.
- Immediate hazards within the Home Ignition Zone on individual properties.
- Concerns presented by common/open space areas or adjacent public lands.
